

Internet Safety Workshops

Debbie Wardel from the Lincolnshire Stay Safe Partnership visited school to deliver Online Safety Workshops across the school.

The children watched videos of a character making the wrong choices online by saying mean things, clicking on pop-ups and watching scary videos. The children talked about how they could make better choices and seek help from a grown up if they need help online.

Pupils in Narnia were online superheroes, learning what personal information is safe to share and what needs to remain private. The children were taught how to block and report and when to talk to an adult for help.

Pupils in Hogwarts were also discussing information sharing online and issue that may happen when interacting with strangers online.

Research shows that children whose parents take an active role in their child's online lives are less likely to face issues and more likely to get support.

Please talk to your pupils about the workshops. Find out what apps and games they use and/or spend time with them in their digital world. Having open conversations helps enable our children to have the skills to navigate the online world safely.

🔥 What Made the Fire of London So Great? 🔥

Last term, Neverland explored our amazing capital city, London — discovering its landmarks, history and what makes it such a special place. This term, we have travelled back in time to 1666 to uncover the story of the Great Fire of London and find out what made it so “great”! What a busy morning the children had bringing history to life! The children became bakers just like in 1666, making (and tasting!) their own delicious bread. They carefully created houses from Pudding Lane, thinking about why the fire spread so quickly between the tightly packed wooden buildings.

It has been a fantastic and engaging start to the term. The children showed great teamwork, creativity and curiosity as they stepped back in time. We can't wait to continue our journey into the past and discover even more about this important event in London's history!



🏛️ This term, Narnia are building on their learning about Europe and will be exploring the ancient civilisation of Greece. Miss Haynes launched the topic “Would you rather be an Athenian or a Spartan?” with a Greek food tasting session giving the children a delicious introduction to Greek culture. This hands-on experience helped them think about what daily life might have been like in Ancient Greece and encouraged them to try new flavours.

They then took part in learning the Hasapiko, a traditional Greek dance. To complete the day, the children explored Greek architecture by learning how to draw an **Ionic column**, recognised by the elegant spirals, or *volute*s, at the top. This activity helped them understand why these architectural features remain iconic and influential today.
